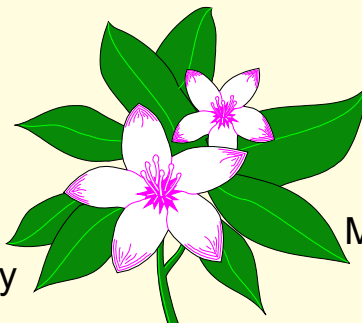

From the Desk of Deacon Dan...

What do Catholics believe?

That question can be easily answered because we have creeds that define our system of beliefs. In fact, we have two creeds. The word creed is derived from the Latin credo which means "I Believe." The creeds are structured on the fundamental belief in the Trinity and the "work" proper to each of the three Persons: The Father and creation; the Son and redemption; and the Holy Spirit and sanctification.

Why do we have two creeds? That is because the first is rooted in the teachings of the Apostles and as such is called the Apostles Creed. The second, the Nicene Creed, was produced by the Council of Nicea I (325) which was convoked to combat the heresy of Arius, who denied the divinity of Christ. The Council wanted to teach very clearly that Jesus Christ is "consubstantial" or "one in Being" with the Father, sharing the same divine nature; that He is begotten, not made or created; and that Mary conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit, and through her, Jesus Christ, true God, became also true man." The Nicene Creed was further refined at later councils and it is used at most Sunday masses. The Apostles Creed is still used mostly because it is simpler to understand and more appropriate for masses where mostly children are present.

So that you can see the difference in the two prayers I have included them here.

The Apostles Creed

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day, He rose again. He ascended to Heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints,

the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting.

The Nicene Creed

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one baptism for the forgiveness of sins, and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come.

Completing a quick read of the two prayers we can tell that the Apostles Creed and the Nicene Creed do not contradict each other. The Apostles Creed is a simpler subset of the Nicene Creed. However, there are tremendous differences that need to be reconciled for us to have an adequate understanding of that original question. The most important take-away from these two different, yet similar prayers is, "I Believe!"

We will dig much deeper into this topic in the coming months. I hope you are as excited about understanding the creeds as I am.
